Parish Council Snippets

Apologies for absence were received from Borough Councillor Janet Farebrother and Cumbria Police.

Police Report

Weather vane stolen from a house in Papcastle on 2nd October.

Robert Jackson said that a theft of diesel from machinery had also been investigated by the Police.

Planning Applications

Re-submission of outline application for four houses on land at Belle Vue.

Outline application for up to ten houses on land adjacent to the Mount.

Parish Council advised refusal on both.

Planning Decisions

Wind turbine at Springfield Farm, Greysouthen. Refused

Outline application for two houses adjacent to Belle Mount, Papcastle. Refused.

Note to residents who write to Allerdale Borough Council regarding planning applications. If an application is withdrawn and subsequently re submitted, any previous correspondence will not be considered with the new application and you will need to write again. It is worthwhile following the applications online or checking with the Parish Council, so that your views will be considered.

Residents' Complaints

The two main reasons for residents to complain to the Council, are parking and dog fouling.

We have no yellow lines in the village, so parking on pavements, near road junctions or generally causing obstructions has become more common. While lack of space for increasing numbers of vehicles is a major factor, residents are asked to park as considerately as possible.

Despite having bins in seven locations around the village, dog fouling continues to be a problem. Responsible dog owners feel that they too are under suspicion, so are very keen for everyone to act responsibly.

Please pick up after your dog and don't leave it for your neighbours to do.

Opposition Mounting

The proposed development by Thomas
Armstrong Ltd. of up to ten houses on land
adjacent to The Mount, was
discussed at an open meeting in the
village hall on Tuesday 27th October. The
development is on such a scale that the
Parish Council felt that a
consultation meeting to assess
residents' views would be of benefit. David
Johnson, Chairman of the Parish
Council, chaired the meeting with Pete
Broad acting as secretary.

A letter of invitation had been delivered to every house in the village and the hall was packed, with standing room only at the back. The Chairman commenced by going through the statements in the Fairhurst Report (for Thomas Armstrong Ltd.,) after which views and questions were invited from the floor.

This was a very informative session, with many valid points raised as to the impact the proposed development would have on Papcastle, Belle Vue and Cockermouth itself.

The feeling in the hall that the development should be opposed, was unanimous, and as well as objections from the Parish Council, residents were asked to contact Allerdale Borough Council individually. It was suggested that the Parish Council request an extension of the consultation end date from the 6th to 11th of November, in order to do this.

At the November Parish Council meeting, it was agreed to formally lodge an objection to the development with Allerdale Borough Council.

Report from District Councillor Nicky Cockburn

I am very enthusiastic about the Lower Derwent Parish Council Cluster, where Parish Councils combine to act together on issues and which is an idea I shamelessly copied from the Rural Group in the Aspatria area. Acting in such a group has the full support of your local Parish Council.

At the very first "test", which was a planning application for a wind turbine at Greysouthen, a Parish Councillor from Dean was able to address the Development Panel on behalf of five Parish Councils. It was felt that this added weight to the argument against the turbine. Permission was unanimously refused.

It is undoubtedly useful for neighbouring parishes to be able to support each other when necessary.

Another issue which I feel strongly about, is the need for the village to have an emergency plan in case of serious events, either natural or man made.

Along with a Workington District Councillor, I recently attended a fascinating Emergency Planning Scenario, with representatives from Fire and Rescue, Police, Coastguard, Mountain Rescue, Army and Voluntary Sector.

I look forward to discussing this at a future Parish Council meeting.

Vesela Remembered

On Monday, 26th October 2015, on what would have been Vesela Chiviyski's 45th birthday, a fundraising day was held in her memory by husband, Todor and children Elena and Bobby at The Belle Vue public house. Many people from Belle Vue/Papcastle and surrounding area attended.

Vesela was diagnosed with neuroendocrine cancer in January of this year and sadly, she died in July. Macmillan Nurses supported the family throughout Vesela's illness and continue to do so. Todor says 'they do an excellent job' and wanted to give something back to them.

On the fundraising day ten per cent of all takings were donated together with money collected in boxes in the restaurant. To date, over £850 has been raised for Macmillan Cancer Support through this and cake sales at Bobby's school.

Vesela's mother has been living with the family since July and will stay over the Winter months. Todor is keen to keep the family- run business going and says the family have made lots of friends here in Belle Vue/Papcastle.



Maureen Hargreaves died only 2 weeks after moving from Papcastle, where she had lived for over 30 years. Stan Leigh, her neighbour, has provided this appreciation of her life here:

Maureen, formerly of Orchard Garth, passed away at her daughter Annie's home in Torquay on Tuesday 29th September.

Maureen and her late husband Eric were from Burnley in Lancashire. They lived in Broughton and Cockermouth before moving to Papcastle 30 years ago. This photograph of her was taken in 1987 at Orchard Garth, the home that she loved very much. She had been a librarian and then a teacher and many in Cockermouth recall fond memories of her teaching at Fairfield Juniors while Eric taught maths at secondary level. Her interests included literature, poetry, social history and with Eric had been a keen adventurer in her beloved Lake District. Eric had been Chairman of the Cockermouth Mountain Rescue Team and a few years ago she surprised me by showing me with pride a letter that Eric had received from the now famous Alfred Wainwright in 1966. She was a keen member of the U3A's Literature Group and her friends told me about her contribution to the success of the Group. She loved recalling happy days on the fells and talking about the beauty of words particularly when it came from the Lakeland poets. I enjoyed passing time with her when she recalled some of her



favourite walks, poetry and she always took time to encourage me with my Lakeland writing. Her knowledge of Cockermouth was just amazing. Before she moved to Torquay, she wanted me to have a few of her Lakeland books, old maps and a thesis that she had written when at Charlotte Mason College at Ambleside entitled, 'Cockermouth Members of Parliament and Parliamentary Elections, 1295 to 1885. It is an amazing piece of work. Maureen was a quiet, softly spoken individual who spent much of her time reading but would occasionally take short walks in the village when the weather was good.

Despite Maureen's very quiet demeanour, her close neighbours recall with a smile that when she returned from Cockermouth in her bright red BMW that just before she turned into her drive [there is a bend where visibility is poor], she would sound her horn with some energy. After we had recovered from the sudden blast, we were happy to know that she had returned home – safe and sound.
