
I cannot finish without thanking my predecessor, Huw Morgan, and wish him well in the future.

Parish Council Highlights

The Parish Council met on the 4th September with apologies for absence from Brian Merris, Councillor Nikki Cockburn (Allerdale Borough Council) Councillor Janet Farebrother (Allerdale Borough Council) and Cumbria Constabulary.

There was no public participation in the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting of the 4th July were approved as a true record. (note that these Minutes and the Agenda for the September meeting are available on the village website: Papcastle.org.uk).

Police Report: 4A written report was available which listed two incidents in the vicinity of the village; the theft of a horsebox trailer from a field off the A595, and equipment theft from business premises in an unspecified location.

Matters arising: The storm damaged cherry tree on The Mount had been thinned and the damaged limb removed by Cumbria County Council. The overhanging shrubs on the corner of The Mount adjacent to No.59 will be reported to the County Council for reduction.

It was noted that some gullies had been cleared of debris, but further action was needed. The Parish Council asked Mr Trohear to investigate.

Report from County and District Councillors: Councillor Hanson reported that Cumbria County Council had been focusing on improving governance and focus, with positive results.

A written report had been received from Councillor Cockburn which pointed out that Allerdale Borough Council had, in the last week, issued the Allerdale Local Plan Part II and that specifically there were no large packets of land allocated for housing development in the Parish.

Defibrillator: The parish Council had been approached regarding the possible installation of an AED Defibrillator in the redundant telephone kiosk at the corner of the Mount which had been in reduced service for some time, usable only for emergency calls. NHS North West had offered to provide a new defibrillator and arrange installation, provided the Parish Council undertook to fund ongoing consumables, and undertook to check the function regularly. After some discussion with the Village Hall Trustees, it was decided that we would agree to the removal of the out-of-date Defibrillator from the porch of the Village Hall and agree to the modern public access device in the 'phone box'.

Village website: The parish Council had accepted that it was the de facto owner of the Website, and had agreed to fund the annual service subscription for the domain name. The website had recently been brought up to date with all Parish Council Meeting Minutes and Agendas, and relevant documents relating to General Data Protection regulations.

Planning applications to consider: None

Planning decisions (by Parish Council):

2/2018/0249 – application for approval of reserved matters following outline application 2/2016/06313, single dwelling, West Winds Cottage. - agreed

Any Other Business: The issue of poor or inconsiderate parking in the village was discussed again, but it was recognised that the Parish Council had limited powers to improve matters. Notices had been posted in the Village Hall encouraging users to act with consideration.

After three decades in the village, Greg and Gill Greenhalgh recently said a fond farewell to Papcastle to begin a new chapter of their lives in Cockermouth. Their five children, David, Andrew, Jon, Rachel and Robyn 'flew the nest' from Cedar Lodge some years ago and Greg and Gill felt it was time to 'right size' to a new home more suited to their needs. Greg, a former editor of 'The Villager' said; "we were very sad to be saying goodbye to our long-standing friends and neighbours in Papcastle but are now looking forward to building a new home in Cockermouth".

Both Greg and Gill were very active in the village community. Gill worked with other villagers to run a Papcastle Youth Club in the late 1990's and was instrumental - pardon the pun- in setting up the Papcastle Community Orchestra in the early 2000's. She also organised the Papcastle



Open Garden Scheme which raised monies for local charities as well as bringing together the village community. Gill's community singing group, Voice Dot Com, performed in the Village Hall in the aftermath of the 2009 floods raising funds for the Flood Action Group. Greg meanwhile worked closely with other villagers in the same year to publish a history of Papcastle.

Both keen Ballroom Dancers, Greg & Gill used the Village Hall throughout the autumn of 2014 teaching local celebrities to dance for a fund raising spectacular at the Kirkgate Centre. We too were sad to say goodbye to Greg & Gill but send them best wishes for their new life in Cockermouth.

Both Mavis and her husband David were evacuated to the area, Mavis being only 5 years old at the time. I have acquired a book about the evacuees from Mavis which she bought some time ago whilst on a visit to Cockermouth. It got me thinking and I thought it may make a good article for the Villager. I would like to hear from anyone who has any recollections of those times – were you evacuated? Do you remember the impact of having evacuees imposed upon the area? The Allotment

If you have ever wandered down the lane to the river and wondered what was behind the gate on the right hand side, here is your answer. This secret garden is a place of much sweat, many midge bites and a few tears. Like when your carefully sown row of parsnips just doesn't appear. When the mice have nibbled most of your beetroot. When the birds have eaten all your cherries before they are even ripe. When the slugs get the better part of the lettuce. And when you can't face the sight of another courgette.

But it is beautiful. And peaceful (except for the building works going on over the other side of the river). And somehow has a calming effect after even the most stressful of days. Even when we are carting kegs of water down to keep our seedlings alive in the recent drought. Or doing battle with the nettles, docks and thistles.

Being on the flood plain, the ground is very fertile, and the owner Robert Jackson says that it has always been an orchard and vegetable garden. We are thankful that he allows us to rent this precious space.
