## The Annual Village Barbecue 2022


As ever, a very popular event and a huge success. Many thanks to Debbie, David,

PAPCASTLE COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA GETS A NEW NAME

Many of you will know that in 2007 a small group of local people were encouraged to dust off their instruments and gather together once a month in our village hall to make music. The initiator was music lover Gill Greenhalgh, previously of Cedar Lodge, who wanted to provide the opportunity for anyone, regardless of standard, to play with other like-minded people who enjoyed music. The group was expertly led by Papcastle resident Dr Philip Wood, who arranged well-known pieces so that they could be played by amateur musicians. The group was originally called "Playing by Ear," although you did really need to be able to read music to join in, so by 2009 the name was changed to "Papcastle Community Orchestra". By 2016, under Phil's skilful supervision,

By 2016, under Phil's skilful supervision, aided by Gabrielle Sanders and the rest of the committee, the number of players had increased from 11 to 43, so a move to a larger venue was necessary. The Orchestra now meets once a month on a Tuesday evening in the United Reform Church in Cockermouth and, since most of its members now do not live in Papcastle, its committee took the decision to change their name to the Cockermouth Community Orchestra. However, it is still directed by Phil, has many of the original Papcastle players and remains true to Gill's vision, by providing an opportunity for everyone to play their instrument with others.

\*\*THE MAN WITH THE BATON\*\*

I wanted to find out more about the man behind the success of this Papcastle venture, so I had a little chat with Phil and this is what I discovered:

Phil first encountered classical music at the age of 8 when the local secondary school orchestra visited his primary school, "I was blown away by the Radetzky March by Johann Strauss Sar", he says. Whilst his family were not interested in classical music, he became so interested in famous composers that he used to research and memorise facts about them. He started composing rhythms and trying to write down notes even before he could play an instrument, knowing at the age of ten that music would be his career. In secondary school, his inspirational music teacher Peter Kitson. He collected classical LPs, playing them on his little record player at home, when the rest of us were lis

Not a natural leader, Phil admits that he is quite nervous before stepping up to the podium, and this was considerably worse before a performance of Sir Malcolm Arnold's Grand, Grand Overture in 2013 when he realised that Kathryn Arnold (Sir Malcolm's daughter) was in the audience! The Covid lockdown meant that live music received a serious blow in 2019, but it is bouncing back: the most recent performance by the newly named Cockermouth Community Orchestra, which closed the Cockermouth Live event on 3 July, was a sell out! Phil says that his compositions express his appreciation of the beauty of the natural world, reflecting the sound of water and birdsong, the woods, lakes, shadows and the changing seasons, as in his four-part piece "Postcards from Cockermouth". He also finds inspiration in poetry and prose, writing music to Shakespeare and Wordsworth's "Daffodils" poem, for example. But more than anything, he likes to compose music for people he knows: he writes to the strengths of the musicians he works with, for his community orchestra and as birthday gifts for his friends.

At 50, Phil says he has realised all his ambitions as a composer and is content, although he will continue composing for as long as he "has the itch". He is keen to go on conducting, perhaps setting up a small chamber group in addition to the full orchestra. Musical interaction with others is what gives him a buzz.

## More Tales of the River Bank

FOOTPATH CLOSED <u>հենեն Մանդեն Մ</u>

Despite the sign on the gate, the flood prevention works under the bypass bridge have now been completed and the footpath is open - for the moment, until the next flood. Much to Robert Jackson's frustration, the civil engineers ordered the retaining wall to be *lowered* by 18 inches and to be shored up with jagged slate blocks rather than the large limestone boulders which were previously there (and are now lying abandoned on the river bed). They fear that limestone will dissolve into the river water affecting its PH value - this despite the fact that tributary streams flow over limestone outcrops just down river. From his experience of previous flood events, Robert fears that

will catch the jagged slate and dislodge the blocks,

destroying the wall, and that the bank will be undermined yet again, even though both the concrete bridge supports and bank in between have been reinforced and raised, also by 18 inches.

Downstream from the bridge, however, the public right of way teeters precariously along the top of the eroded bank. There are currently no plans to shore up this part of the river bank. Take care and keep your wellies close at hand folks!

## **Parish Council Snippets**

Meeting held on Tuesday 6th September at 7.30pm in the Village Hall

**Present:** David Johnson (Chairman), Robert Jackson, Robert Jackson Jnr, Jackie Day, Ian Trohear, Jill Coyle, Huw Morgan (Vice Chair), Brian Merris, John Conlon, Councillor Catherine Bell (Cumbria County Council) plus one member of the public.

**Apologies for absence** were received from Councillor Nicky Cockburn (Allerdale Borough Council (ABC) and from Councillor Janet Farebrother (ABC)

**Public Participation**: Mary Bradley, a member of the **Nuclear Waste Management Services Engagements Team**, gave an informative talk, explaining the details of the search area for suitable sites for a geological disposal facility for high level radioactive waste. She said that there were many considerations, including geology and climate change. Any area considered suitable, could not be used without the consent of the local community, with a referendum probably necessary. During an earlier site selection process, two communities in Cumbria, Allerdale and Copeland had expressed interest in hosting a repository.

She also mentioned the forthcoming electoral boundary changes and a new Cumberland Council which could decide whether or not they want the area to be considered for storage. Mrs Bradley stressed that this is a long term project and that extra funding would be available for the benefit of the communities taking part.

**Riverbank:** Robert Jackson reported on the work that had been done - the bank on the underpass had been lifted by 18 inches and the wall height dropped by the same amount. Robert stated his opinion that in the event of a flood, the large shards of slate used in the construction would be washed out and he has asked United Utilities to look at the work. Councillor Bell reported that she has been in contact with the County Council and United Utilities regarding the work. It was agreed to write to the County Council expressing concern about the standard of work.

**Gulley Emptying:** This work has been carried out, but David Johnson said that a gulley at Belle Vue was still blocked, and thought that a pipe leading to the gulley had possibly been damaged.

**Pumping Station Brigham:** Still not adequately screened from view - United Utilities have been contacted about planting screening trees.

**Castle Gardens:** An email has been received from the Independent Living Lettings and Neighbourhoods Officer concerning the lack of public transport and other amenities, which was leading to difficulties in letting the bungalows. The Parish Council has tried in the past to support a regular bus service, but the service had been withdrawn.

**Public Participation:** A question was asked about the felling of trees in a local garden. The Chairman explained that the garden in question was privately owned, not in a Conservation Area, and no trees were under a Preservation Order, so this was not within the remit of the parish council.
