





Organised and hosted perfectly by Michelle and Brian, this was a lively gathering of villagers to celebrate Germany's annual beer festival. We sampled a delightful selection of sausages: Volkswagen Currywurst, mini Bratwurst, Original Nürnberger, Bockwurst, Vienna pork mini Frankfurter, Vienna Beef Mini Frankfurters, and Weißwurst, together with Munich Style Pretzel and crusty rolls, German potato salad, smoked cheese and salami, all washed down with lashings of Tractor Shed German style helles Bier from the brewery at Seaton, Monkey 47 gin from the Black Forest, Sloe gin from

Bavaria, traditional Apfelschnapps, Riesling and Gewürztraminer wines and red Pinot Noir from Germany's

Rheinhessen region. When sausaged-out, we went on to dessert: Apfelstrudel and German style vanilla custard, chocolate Pretzel and mini Stollen, all accompanied by music from the Munich Bierkeller and loads of chat. If this has made your mouths water, watch out for the next one. Prost!



The Joy of Quilting

In my continuing quest to uncover the many talents hidden inside the homes of Papcastle and Belle Vue residents, I was privileged to be invited to Salmon Lodge to see the beautiful works of art created in textiles by Janet Johnston.

Janet has always been fascinated by needlework: she started dressmaking in her teenage years, making her own clothes and later those of her children. She experimented with cross stitch, then Hardanger lace until she was introduced to quilting thirty years ago. She started making patchwork quilts and was soon supplying her extended family with her unique designs. she joined several craft groups and even went on specialist themed holidays to India and Japan to explore their needlework traditions. On the wall of her conservatory hangs an impressive example of an embroidered tent cloth from Cairo.





Today she concentrates on works of art using quilting and embroidery techniques that express her feelings. She showed me her favourite: an exquisite wall hanging in the style of the Austrian surrealist artist Friedensreich Hundertwasser (left). The different colours, textures and shapes of the materials she uses combine to create a wonderfully vibrant and tactile effect. Buttons and beads, glittery threads, wispy iron-on Angelina thread, shimmery fabrics, ruched quilting — all contributing to an entrancing and commanding piece.

Escorting me to her bright and spacious sewing room stuffed full of boxes of interesting materials, Janet says that when she is sewing she is "in her happy place". Completely focused on a new project, she brings her creative vision to the large wall-mounted design board when deciding which fabrics and colours to use. "I'm happier here than anywhere else," she admits. Sometimes she bases her creation on the work of another artist, as with the Hundertwasser quilt, sometimes on a poem, as with Wordsworth's Daffodils (top right). She even based one on the Shipping Forecast for Cromarty, interpreting the fierce wind (the Gentle Annis) which can blow down the Firth (next page).





Janet's magnificent works of art are not for sale, even though she has run out of wall space to display them all. "I put so much of myself into these quilts," she confides, that she cannot bear to part with them, although she does sometimes give them away as presents.

She attended a year-long course in quilting design in Penrith, run by the leading Scottish artist Pat Archibald, and currently meets once a month with Maureen Lamb's quilting group "Connected by Thread" in Embleton for a day's indulgence, companionship and guidance. In October 2022 they held a

successful exhibition of their work at Embleton Village Hall.

When asked if needlework is a dying craft, Janet says that since the Covid lockdown creative textiles

have undergone a revival. People have rediscovered the quiet satisfaction of taking time to create something beautiful and unique from within themselves.

Osprey Talk

Continuing with our informative talks in the Village Hall, we were pleased to welcome Glenys Pyke from Ullock to give us an insight into Ospreys. Glenys has volunteered for the Osprey Project at Bassenthwaite Lake since its inception in 2001 and was therefore able to enlighten us on the fascinating life of these birds. Visiting us from early April through to



September, we have over the years had various nesting pairs of Ospreys returning to Bassenthwaite Lake to raise their chicks. Glenys' enthusiastic presentation showed magnificent close up photographs of these wonderful birds perching, in flight, on the nest and catching fish together with the migration route they take to Senegal when they leave our shores. We are lucky to have such wonderful nature on our doorstep and thank Glenys for sharing her photographs and knowledge with us.

Whisky Tasting

On Friday 21st October, Stephen Walker from The Cockermouth Whisky Tasting Club gave an illuminating talk on whisky to a lively crowd of 20 villagers. Stephen, who works part time at The Lakes Distiller, introduced 5 specialist whiskies, ranging from the Isle of Mull to as far afield as Canada. There was a 12-year old Tobermory, a Glasgow 1770 and a smoky old Ballantruan, all accompanied by cheese and biscuits. One whisky was 64.5% proof, the minimum for a Scotch whisky being 40%, and one whisky cost £74 a bottle! Did you know that 60% of the taste of whisky comes from the



cask in which it matures? Most of the casks are originally used in the American Bourbon and Spanish Sherry industries. Many thanks to the organisers Penny and Magdi.

David Wood

9th June 1938 - 10th January 2023

David, originally from Felling, Tyne and Wear, moved to The Mount with his family in the early 70's from Worcester. He worked as an electrical engineer with Norweb (later United utilities) and this gave him the opportunity to travel around Cumbria on a variety of projects - all of which were stored

away for future conversations and anecdotes.



When he retired, he treated himself to a sporty Mercedes, and splashed out on holidays to Australia where he enjoyed visiting distant relatives. He liked to walk daily, usually into Cockermouth for coffee and scones, and you couldn't miss him in his green/blue cable knit jumper either in the garden or around the village. He also served as a member of the parish council for some time. He was always happy to help if anyone wanted advice, particularly if he could utilise some Norweb knowledge. More recently David was caring for his wife Ann who developed dementia during COVID until his own cancer diagnosis resulted in them both residing at Dalton Court, where he died peacefully on Tuesday, January 10th. He is much missed by his children, Christopher and Nicola, his grandchildren, Fred and Alex and son in law, Mark, and of course our Village.

Meeting held on Tuesday 1st November at 7.30pm in the Village Hall

River Bank: Robert Jackson reported ongoing concerns about the standard of work on the riverbank carried out by United Utilities. There were difficulties in getting a proper response and he was also awaiting confirmation of a site meeting. Councillor Bell has also been in contact with both the County Council and United Utilities regarding the standard of work.

Pumping Station Brigham: A request had been made to United Utilities re improved screening of the site. An update to be requested.

Planning Application: There were no objections to a planning application at 55 The Mount.

Papcastle Recreational Trust: Brian Merris gave an update on the meeting held on 5th October, when it was agreed to give £100 to the Village Hall for a Halloween Party and £200 for a Christmas Party. It was unanimously agreed to donate £100 to the Great North Air Ambulance Charity.
