







Pet Feeding Services!


























Share the Music

Many share Angela's music on a Sunday morning via our Village WhatsApp group or through YouTube, but not everyone knows how far afield Angela's talent is heard.

Angela started playing the organ on her first Bontempi Organ at the age of 4, progressing to a Hammond organ at the age of 6. Her parents were very supportive, to the extent that it was often a choice between a new car or a new organ when an upgrade was requested. Organ or Keyboard usually won! Angela's first Talent Contest was on the Isle of Man, aged 8. She won this and her fellow players from Cumbria also won. A clean musical sweep. She was playing at The White Horse Inn, Threlkeld from the age of 7, entertaining most Saturday nights, with her parents overseeing.



Her parents decided to move out of farming and into the pub business when Angela was 13. They took over The Bird in Hand at Oulton and Angela started to play on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings at her parents' pub for 8 years, entertaining numerous people who came for the live music.

Having passed her driving test at 17, Angela was able to progress to Organ Festivals, which then led her on to Organ Societies around the country. Angela also made several visits to the Spanish Organ Festival, extending her enjoyment of music even further afield.

Angela was part of an active band for many years: Tolo's Reunion Band. The band was made up of Bass Guitar, Lead Guitar, Lead Singer and Backing by Angela (piano, drums and backing vocals). They were a lively local band that played mainly for fund raising, playing Rock and Roll, The Shadows and many more, all over Cumbria, including Moota, Greenhill and Stanwix Park, Silloth. The band disbanded when Angela's sight deteriorated. However Angela's partial sightedness did not stop her love of her music, nor prevent her from making regular appearances on YouTube and our own Whatsapp Group as well as playing the organ at Bridekirk Church.





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Angela had played the organ at Blackpool Tower in her younger days, and had a wonderful time earlier this year when she and her husband David went back there and both played The Tower's amazing organ. They also went to see the new Yamaha CVP 909 there, as it was launched at a keyboard festival. Whilst it was on the stage, in between a concert by the main Yamaha demonstrator, she was able to try it out for an hour. The organiser of the festival was so impressed by her playing that he included Angela in his report in the Keyboard Cavalade magazine. The main purpose of going was to see if Angela could still see the buttons (because of her sight problems) since they

had changed the colour from red/green to blue/white. Once she was happy, they ordered the new model which is one of the first in the country. She loves her new Keyboard!

Although Angela has just been registered as severely sight impaired, this has not hampered her passion and enthusiasm for music. She can read some music using helpful devices, but the majority of her music is through memory, listening and perseverance. Angela's positive attitude and passion for her Keyboard is clearly evident in her skilful playing and in her generous sharing of this talent. Thank you Angela, your music is much appreciated.

Footpath Closed!



The right of way along the river bank has lain underwater since the collapse of the river bank in 2009.

This means that the footpath from Papcastle to Great Broughton is closed along this stretch. Sadly, there are no plans to re-route the footpath. The field adjacent to the river bank at this point belongs to Robert Jackson, although United Utilities retain access points to their pipeline within it.

Historical Papcastle Walks

Villagers may have been asked by visitors to point the way to the Roman Fort and Papcastle Station. Replying is often not straight forward and needs a little thought and historical context before the visitor is satisfied and able to head off to continue their exploration.

Our local walks are included on the http://www.papcastle.org.uk, which features "The Roman Road", "Priest's Bridge to Broughton Beck and on to the Derwent", and "The Riverbank". Currently there is a restriction on the Derwent riverbank – see further details in this newsletter. Sometimes it is necessary to gain access to the river from the road to Broughton.



There are many lovely natural features and interesting historical buildings to be seen on these walks, including the former Railway Buildings & Priest's Bridge.

The Railway



There are the raised embankments and bridge abutments at the former crossing to Brigham and alongside Broughton Beck, from the days when the Derwent Branch of the Maryport and Carlisle Railway was operating

between Brigham, Papcastle, Dovenby Lodge and on to Bullgill. The photo on the left shows the bridge complete and right, in a

collapsed state. Two workers were killed during the demolition soon after the line was closed in 1935.

Papcastle Station (photo top right) was opened in 1867, located over a mile from the village. Sidings to the substantial Broughton Craggs Quarry led off the line opposite the station. Services continued to 1935.



Dovenby Lodge Railway Station was also opened in 1867. It was a private station solely for the use of the Ballentine-Dykes family of Dovenby Lodge, one of whom was the Chairman of the Maryport and Carlisle Railway in 1840's. The station was available for use until the line closed in 1935. There is a railway bridge just up the hill in the Broughton direction for a view of the station.



Priest's Bridge



Alongside the railway is a fascinating bridge over Broughton Beck which has provided a local mystery that has left many of us curious. Why is it called Priest's Bridge?

A few years ago, I appealed for information through one of my Cockermouth Post articles for information regarding the name of the bridge. I had exhausted my enquiries with local Church Ministers and historians. Then a former Broughton resident, Neil Henderson of Eaglesfield, phoned me up and explained that Broughton to Bridekirk was a Coffin Route. A group would transport the coffin to the bridge where they would be met by the priest and

coffin bearers to continue conveyance on for the burial at St. Bridget's Church. I later found details of burials at Bridekirk Church from 16th century which confirmed Neil's information.

My thanks also to the owners of Station House, Dovenby for permission to display images of their property including the platform.

Parish Council Snippets

From the meetings held on 23rd May and 4th July 2023

The following points were discussed, which may be of interest to Villagers:

- Closure of the River Bank Path due to erosion between Papcastle and Great Broughton, and the inadequate signs put up by the County Council, which have now blown off.
- The remaking of the field by **United Utilities**, which will not quite be returned to its previous state, as the concrete access points will need to be retained.
- **Discharge of sewage** into the river Derwent by United Utilities at the Cockermouth Treatment works. 98 incidents in the past year.
- **Potholes**: those in Belle Vue have been repaired. Potholes in Papcastle Road opposite Ordgarff/the Burrows have been reported to Cumberland County Council.
- An information evening on Community Energy to be held in the Village Hall by Community Action for Sustainability (CAFS) to inform villagers about solar panels and insulation, with the possibility of a planning officer from the CCC attending to answer questions from home owners of listed buildings and those in the conservation area.
- The formation of a **Community Energy Group** to promote community schemes to combat climate change.
- The problems caused by **inconsiderate and illegal parking** in the village and the feasibility of a 20mph speed limit in the village to protect children and pedestrians forced to walk on the road because of cars blocking pavements.
- Overgrown hedges in domestic gardens, which are also causing problems for motorists and pedestrians.
- **Village Hall Rates Increase** together with increased energy costs there is now a threatened removal of the 20% discretionary reduction.
- The continuing impassable condition of the **Spittal Lane** public footpath (between Papcastle Road and Gote Road) due to overgrown nettles and brambles.
- **Community funds** available from County Council Villagers are encouraged to write to their councillor (Helen Tucker) requesting funds for projects which benefit their community.
- **Bin Strikes:** Councillor Helen Tucker spoke at length about the reasons for the current bin strikes and lack of a resolution. She advised villagers to continue to take their recycling to Sullart Street, to help neighbours without transport with their recycling and to report full bins at Sullart Street immediately to Cumberland County Council. She does this herself on a weekly basis with quick response.
- Planning permissions: Cumberland Council approval to tree works at Sunnyside, and for listed building consent for single storey extension at Manor House and Manor Cottage. Further enquiries to be made regarding extension at Low Wood, Belle Vue and new garage and ponds at Bonny Hill, Bridekirk. Application received for whole crown reduction and thinning of trees at Derwent Lodge.

Full minutes with actions agreed are posted on the village notice boards once they have been approved. **Date and time of next meeting: Tuesday 5**th **September 7.30 pm in the Village Hall.** Anyone is welcome to attend. The chairman's permission must be sought if you wish to contribute.

Parking Reminder



The Parish Council would like to remind all car owners that according to paragraph 243 of the Highway Code, it is illegal to park opposite or within 10 metres of a junction. This is really difficult in the centre of the village so it is rarely enforced (though beware - it has been!). However, it is vital that you do not restrict visibility at junctions, bends and on the brow of a hill, and that you always ensure there is enough space for emergency vehicles to get through. Please be considerate and use common sense.

According to paragraph 244 you should not park on pavements. We don't have many in Papcastle, so pedestrians are forced on to the road anyway. To protect them, the Parish Council is looking at introducing a 20 mph speed limit in the village.
