Village Hall News

At the end of last year we were successful in obtaining a grant of £10,000 from United Utilities and we are now using this to upgrade the heating system in the hall. This year we will be applying for a 'Fit for the Future' Lottery Grant to fund the replacement of the slate roof.

ACT (Action with Communities in Cumbria) have been asked to assist the National Lottery to 'increase the capacity of every community space' and will help applicants through the grant application process by getting them 'Fit for Funding'.

What does this mean for us?

- · Firstly, we will have to achieve Level 1 of the Hallmark Quality Standards Scheme for village halls. We already meet most of the criteria and are well on the way to putting in place the other governance, compliance, risk management and financial control protocols required.
- Then we need to develop a plan and a 'story' to go with it based not on the need for 'a new roof on the building' but on what we will do with the building to bring people together and build strong relationships in and across our local communities.
- · We will have to show that we are improving the spaces and places that matter to our community and demonstrate better use of the building.
- · The application will need to include evidence that the project is People Led, Strengths Based and Connected.

This is where you can help. With a significant number of completed questionnaires we will be able to show that we have consulted the people in our community, that you are leading the process, that we can make better use of the hall and that there is a will to strengthen our community, to support vulnerable people, encourage neighbourliness and bridge inter-generational gaps.

Reviving the Drop-In?

A good place to start would be with a revival of the Drop-In. This used to be a regular Friday morning event where villagers could drop in for a couple of hours for coffee and a chat with neighbours. It was certainly a hit with my late mother, Elsie, and it was at the Drop-in that she held one of her three 90th birthday parties! The place was rammed to capacity that day, and based on the principle that if there is cake, then they will come, there is no reason why the hall can't be rocking every Friday. But, we will need your help again. With enough volunteers this needn't be too onerous for any individual. Please let us know if you could give a little of your time now and again. If you'd like to help but can't commit regularly, or through the working day, we're also interested in one off events – maybe a quiz night, photography exhibition, slide show, treasure hunt, or anything else that brings people from the village together and helps us to get to know each other a bit more. Stone Walling In Papcastle

As reported in the previous issue of the *Villager*, the Cockermouth & District Civic Trust are currently working with Allerdale BC to put together a 'Local Heritage List' for Allerdale, initially covering the Cockermouth area.





The stone walling in Papcastle is a major feature that defines the character and ambiance of the village. There are a variety of styles from rough stone to dressed stone which probably reflects different dates, builders & stone source.

At driveway entrances there are a variety of features including arches & columns with finials. Clearly the walling has grown as the village has developed, probably primarily during the 19th century. Significant loss or damage to the walling would have a detrimental effect.





Equally, when modifications are necessary in the event of development, considerate design in keeping with the village tradition would help maintain this 'character and ambiance' for future generations.

The quantity of dressed & 'semi-dressed' stone throughout the village suggests that a significant proportion of the stone might have been obtained from the ruins of the Roman Fort, 'Deventio'

Jean Law 1927-2019

Jean Law, nee Storey, was born in Maryport and attended Workington Grammar School. Her first job was in the Harbour Office in Maryport, and it was there that she met Dennis Law. She made such an impression, that after only six weeks, he asked her to wait for him while he went off to war.

They were married in 1949 and lived with her mother Ellen, after whose untimely death, Jean became a full time housewife and mother to Julia, Stuart and Christopher and for a time to her brothers Jack and Malcolm.

As her children grew, Jean went back to work in the library at Netherhall School - the perfect job for someone who loved books and reading.



She was very keen (and very knowledgeable) on Medieval history and anything to do with Ancient Egypt. A holiday on the Nile with Stuart was a real highpoint, and she was able to indulge her other great passion, dressing up, in a costume ball aboard the boat.

Jean loved caravanning and fell walking and could name every Lake District fell.



Many people in the village knew Jean, who was always beautifully dressed and glamourous, and not a few of us were envious of her ability to walk to town and back in high heels!

In later life and as her health declined, many friends and neighbours rallied round and her front door was never locked and the key always in the yard door.

Jean will be sadly missed by her family and friends and very fondly remembered.

Parish Council Snippets

A blocked gulley at Belle Vue has been cleared by CCC, but another has still to be done. The gutters on The Mount also need to be cleared of weeds. ABC informed.

Household bin collections were the cause of a number of complaints. Apart from the present chaos, Papcastle has different collection days within the village. ABC to be asked to revert to the original system where the bins were all emptied on the same day. On the plus side, residents are happy with the crews who man the lorries, finding them helpful and pleasant. However, changes of personnel has meant that new crews aren't familiar with the area and are unaware of residents who need help with their bins. District Councillor Janet Farebrother addressed the problems with the refuse collections. It was agreed to ask the Ops Manager from ABC to take questions at our next meeting.

Neighbourhood Plan meeting to be attended by Councillor Huw Morgan.

Chairman David Johnson explained that test holes being drilled on The Mount by North West Gas, were to look for leaks. Pipes will eventually be replaced with cast iron.

Next meeting Tuesday 10th September at 7.30 in the village hall.

Good Vibrations

Observant residents may well have noticed that the old 'phone box at the lower entrance to The Mount has been decorated with some new stickers! Unfortunately, O2 decided to remove the pay phone from the box several months ago, on the basis that it hadn't been used for a call in over five years, even though the Parish Council had campaigned for it to remain as an Emergency Calls only facility.

Thanks to a scheme operated by The Community Heartbeat Trust however, the 'phone box' has a new use, housing a public



access defibrillator supplied by the Trust, who will also provide new consumables in the event that the defibrillator has to be used. The defibrillator itself (a Cardiac Science Powerheart Automated External Defibrillator!) is quite a sophisticated device that talks to you, so even inexperienced people can use it. The machine is held in a secure, weatherproof cabinet – the yellow box you can see inside the phone box, and a 5-letter/digit code is needed to open it. This code is held by the Ambulance service and would be issued to anyone requesting access to the defibrillator via the Emergency Services. If you think someone needs the use of a defibrillator - DIAL 999 and ask for 'ambulance'

We'll be discussing access to the defibrillator at the next Parish Council meeting on the 10th September.
